BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of Minnesota that it commemorates the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate is directed to prepare a copy of this resolution, to be authenticated by his signature and that of the Chair of the Senate Rules and Administration Committee, and present it to representatives of an appropriate group organizing public commemorations of the birth of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
