The Senate met at 11:00 a.m. and was called to order by the President.

CALL OF THE SENATE

Senator Miller imposed a call of the Senate. The Sergeant at Arms was instructed to bring in the absent members.

(a) detailed income and expense figures;

(b) average vacancy factors;

(c) verified net rentable areas or net usable areas, whichever is appropriate;

(e) projected vacancy factors; and

(f) lease information.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment."

Page 3, line 2, after "vehicles" insert ", as agents for the commissioner,"

Page 3, line 3, after "applies" insert "on the purchase of a snowmobile, all-terrain vehicle, or watercraft" and delete "otherwise"

Page 3, line 4, after "297A.825" insert ", regarding either their collection of use tax or their issuance of refunds to applicants of use tax paid to them in error"

Page 3, line 13, after "Transportation" insert "as agent for the commissioner,"

Page 3, line 16, after "<u>Minnesota</u>" insert "<u>under section 360.018</u>" and delete "<u>sections</u>" and insert "section"

Page 3, line 17, after "297A.82" insert ", regarding the collection of tax by the Department of Transportation" and delete "and 360.018"

Renumber the sections in sequence

Amend the title numbers accordingly
