FIRST READING OF HOUSE BILLS

The following bill was read the first time.

H.F. No. 114: A bill for an act relating to civil actions; suspending the expiring of statutory deadlines imposed upon judicial proceedings during a peacetime emergency; amending Laws 2020, chapter 74, article 1, section 16.

Referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration for comparison with S.F. No. 303, now on General Orders.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Senator Rarick from the Committee on Labor and Industry Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 419: A bill for an act relating to labor and industry; prohibiting transfer of funds from the contractor recovery fund outside of stated purpose; amending Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 326B.89, subdivision 4.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill do pass. Report adopted.

Senator Utke from the Committee on Human Services Licensing Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 269: A bill for an act relating to human services; establishing the family child care regulation modernization project; appropriating money; requiring a report.

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Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill do pass and be re-referred to the Committee on Human Services Reform Finance and Policy. Report adopted.

Senator Utke from the Committee on Human Services Licensing Policy, to which was referred

S.F. No. 297: A bill for an act relating to human services; establishing a task force to review and recommend improvements to human services background study disqualification statutes; requiring a report; appropriating money.

Reports the same back with the recommendation that the bill be amended as follows:

Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

"Section 1. LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE; HUMAN SERVICES BACKGROUND STUDY ELIGIBILITY.

Subdivision 1. Creation; duties. A legislative task force is created to review the statutes relating to human services background study eligibility and disqualifications, including but not limited to Minnesota Statutes, sections 245C.14 and 245C.15, in order to:

(1) evaluate the existing statutes' effectiveness in achieving their intended purposes, including by gathering and reviewing available background study disqualification data;

(2) identify the existing statutes' weaknesses, inefficiencies, unintended consequences, or other areas for improvement or modernization; and

(3) develop legislative proposals that improve or modernize the human services background study eligibility statutes, or otherwise address the issues identified in items (1) and (2) of this subdivision.

Subd. 2. Membership. (a) The task force shall consist of 22 members, appointed as follows:

(1) two members representing licensing boards whose licensed providers are subject to the provisions in Minnesota Statutes, section 245C.03, one appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and one appointed by the senate majority leader;

(2) the commissioner of human services or designee;

(3) the commissioner of health or designee;

(4) two members representing county attorneys and law enforcement, one appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and one appointed by the senate majority leader;

(5) two members representing licensed service providers who are subject to the provisions in Minnesota Statutes, section 245C.15, one appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and one appointed by the senate majority leader;

(6) four members of the public, including two who have been subject to disqualification based on the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, section 245C.15, and two who have been subject to a set-aside based on the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, section 245C.15, with one from each category appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and one from each category appointed by the senate majority leader;

(7) one member appointed by the governor's Workforce Development Board;

(8) one member appointed by the One Minnesota Council on Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity;

(9) two members representing the Minnesota courts, one appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and one appointed by the senate majority leader;

(10) one member appointed jointly by Mid-Minnesota Legal Aid, Southern Minnesota Legal Services, and the Legal Rights Center;

(11) one member representing tribal organizations, appointed by the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council;

(12) two members from the house of representatives, including one appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and one appointed by the minority leader in the house of representatives; and

(13) two members from the senate, including one appointed by the senate majority leader and one appointed by the senate minority leader.

(b) Appointments to the task force must be made by August 18, 2021.

Subd. 3. Compensation. Public members of the task force may be compensated as provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 15.059, subdivision 3.

Subd. 4. Officers; meetings. (a) The first meeting of the task force shall be cochaired by the task force member from the majority party of the house of representatives and the task force member from the majority party of the senate. The task force shall elect a chair and vice chair at the first meeting who shall preside at the remainder of the task force meetings. The task force may elect other officers as necessary.

(b) The task force shall meet at least monthly. The Legislative Coordinating Commission shall convene the first meeting by September 1, 2021.

(c) Meetings of the task force are subject to the Minnesota Open Meeting Law under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 13D.

Subd. 5. **Reports required.** The task force shall submit an interim written report by March 11, 2022, and a final report by December 16, 2022, to the chairs and ranking minority members of the committees in the house of representatives and the senate with jurisdiction over human services licensing. The reports shall explain the task force's findings and recommendations relating to each of the duties under subdivision 1, and include any draft legislation necessary to implement the recommendations.

Subd. 6. Expiration. The task force expires upon submission of the final report in subdivision 5 or December 20, 2022, whichever is later.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment and expires December 31, 2022.

Sec. 2. <u>APPROPRIATION; LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON HUMAN SERVICES</u> BACKGROUND STUDY DISQUALIFICATIONS.

<u>\$.....</u> is appropriated in fiscal year 2022 from the general fund to the Legislative Coordinating Commission for the Legislative Task Force on Human Services Background Study Eligibility under section 1. This is a onetime appropriation.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Sec. 3. <u>APPROPRIATION; BACKGROUND STUDY DATA FOR LEGISLATIVE TASK</u> FORCE ON HUMAN SERVICES BACKGROUND STUDY DISQUALIFICATIONS.

<u>\$.....</u> is appropriated in fiscal year 2022 from the general fund to the commissioner of human services for the Department of Human Services to furnish relevant data on background studies, disqualifications, set-asides, or other relevant topics to the Legislative Task Force on Human Services Background Study Eligibility under section 1. This is a onetime appropriation.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment."

Amend the title as follows:

Page 1, line 2, before "task" insert "legislative"

Page 1, line 3, delete "disqualification" and insert "eligibility"

(a) Notwithstanding Executive Order 20-04, as extended, amended, and otherwise modified by Executive Order 20-08, Executive Order 20-18, Executive Order 20-33, Executive Order 20-99, and any related executive orders issued pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 12.21 or 12.31, a business closed to ingress, egress, use, and occupancy by members of the public pursuant to the executive orders listed may fully operate with no capacity limitations provided that the business:

(1) develops a COVID-19 safety plan, which shall provide site-specific best practices for the business including, but not limited to, health and wellness; social distancing; cleaning, sanitation, and protection; and operations and communications for employees and members of the public; and

(2) makes a good faith effort to maintain a safe and healthful workplace and business operation. No board or licensing agency may impose any additional penalties for a violation of the governor's emergency executive orders.

(b) Any executive order issued pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 12.21 or 12.31, that closes or partially closes or proposes to close or partially close a business to ingress, egress, use, and occupancy by members of the public following enactment of this section must:

(1) be approved by the legislature with a two-thirds vote in both the senate and the house of representatives acting separately prior to implementation of the executive order; and

(2) provide businesses subject to the executive order with 14 calendar days advanced notice of the closure.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment."

(a) The commissioner of health shall design and make publicly available materials for a statewide public information program that:

(1) promotes the benefits of early detection and the importance of discussing cognition with a health care provider;

(2) outlines the benefits of cognitive testing, the early warning signs of cognitive impairment, and the difference between normal cognitive aging and dementia; and

(3) provides awareness of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.

(b) The commissioner shall include in the program materials messages directed at the general population, as well as messages designed to reach underserved communities including but not limited

to rural populations, Native and Indigenous communities, and communities of color. The program materials shall include culturally specific messages developed in consultation with leaders of targeted cultural communities who have experience with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias. The commissioner shall develop the materials for the program by June 30, 2022, and make them available online to local and county public health agencies and other interested parties.

(c) To the extent funds remain available for this purpose, the commissioner shall implement an initial statewide public information campaign using the developed program materials. The campaign must include culturally specific messages and the development of a community digital public forum. These messages may be disseminated by television and radio public service announcements, social media and digital advertising, print materials or other means.

(d) The commissioner may contract with one or more third parties to initially implement some or all of the public information campaign, provided the contracted third party has prior experience promoting Alzheimer's awareness and the contract is awarded through a competitive process. The public information campaign must be implemented by July 1, 2023.

(e) By June 30, 2024, the commissioner shall report to the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees and divisions with jurisdiction over public health or aging on the development of the program materials and initial implementation of the public information campaign, including how and where the funds appropriated for this purpose were spent.

Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION.

\$250,000 in fiscal year 2022 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of health for the purpose of developing and placing online program materials for and initial implementation of the Alzheimer's public information campaign in section 1 and is available until June 30, 2024. Of this amount, no more than \$..... is for the reporting requirement under section 1, paragraph (e)."

(1) The first deadline, March 12, 2021, at 11:59 p.m., is for committees to act favorably on bills in the house of origin.

(2) The second deadline, March 19, 2021, at 6:00 p.m., is for committees to act favorably on bills, or companions of bills, that met the first deadline in the other house.

(3) The third deadline, April 9, 2021, at 11:59 p.m., is for committees to act favorably on major appropriation and finance bills.

Any bills acted on by a House Committee or acted on by a Senate Committee other than those exempted in Joint Rule 2.03 after the second deadline must be referred to the House Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration or the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration for disposition.

Either the House Committee on Rules and Legislative Administration or the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration, when reporting a bill referred to the committee in accordance with Joint Rule 2.03 and this resolution, may waive the application of the Rule and resolution to subsequent actions on that bill by other committees.
