7.28	4.7 All bills authorizing or increasing a sentence of imprisonment to a state correctional
7.29	institution must be referred before passage to the Committee on Judiciary and Public Safety.

7.32	4.9 A bill introduced by a committee need not be referred to a standing committee unless a
