1.2	1. PARLIAMENTARY REFERENCE
1.3	The rules of parliamentary practice contained in Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure
1.4	govern the Senate in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent
1.5	with these rules and orders of the Senate and the joint rules and orders of the Senate and House of
1.6	Representatives.
1.7	2. REPORTING OF BILLS
1.8	Every bill, memorial, order, resolution or vote requiring the approval of the Governor must be
1.9	reported to the Senate on three different days before its passage.
1.10	(a) The first report, called the first reading, is made when it has been received for introduction.
1.11	(b) The second report, called the second reading, is made when it has been considered by all
1.12	the necessary standing committees and is ready for debate.
1.13	(c) The third report, called the third reading, is made when it is ready for final passage.
1.14	3. BILL INTRODUCTION
1.15	3.1 Bills, memorials, and concurrent or joint resolutions may be introduced by a member or
1.16	by a standing committee.
1.17	3.2 The name of the author, authors, or committee must be written on the bill, memorial or
1.18	resolution. The number of authors may not exceed five.
1.19	3.3 An original and two copies are required for introduction.
1.20	3.4 A member or a committee desiring to introduce a bill, memorial or concurrent or joint
1.21	resolution shall deliver it to the office of the Secretary, and the Secretary shall promptly deliver
1.22	all the bills, memorials or concurrent or joint resolutions to the President who shall present
1.23	them to the Senate.
1.24	3.5 During the period between the last day of the session in any odd-numbered year and the
1.25	first day of the session in the following year, a bill filed with the Secretary for introduction must
1.26	be given a file number and may be unofficially referred by the President, with the approval of
1.27	the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration, to an appropriate standing committee
1.28	of the Senate. All bills filed for introduction during this period must be presented to the Senate
1.29	when it reconvenes and must be referred to the standing committees previously indicated by the
1.30	President, subject to objection to the referral under Rule 4.9.
1.31	4. BILL REFERRAL
1.32	4.1 The President shall refer each bill without motion to the proper standing committee
1.33	unless otherwise referred by the Senate.

Temporary Rules of the Senate

4.2 A bill or resolution may not be referred to committee or amended until it has been 2.1 given its first reading. 2.2

4.3 A member may not object to a bill or resolution on its introduction.

4.4 All bills appropriating money, or obligating the state to pay or expend money, or 2.42.5 establishing a policy which to be effective will require expenditure of money, when referred to and reported by any other than the Committee on Finance, must be referred before passage to 2.6 the Committee on Finance. 2.7

4.5 All bills delegating rulemaking to a department or agency of state government and all 2.82.9 bills exempting a department or agency of state government from rulemaking, when referred to and reported by any other than the Committee on State and Local Government Operations, must 2.10 2 11 be referred before passage to the Committee on State and Local Government Operations.

4.6 All bills creating a new commission, council, task force, board, or other body to which a 2 12 member of the legislature will be appointed must be referred before passage both to the Committee 2.13 on State and Local Government Operations and to the Committee on Rules and Administration. 2.14

2.15 4.7 All bills authorizing or increasing a sentence of imprisonment to a state correctional institution must be referred before passage to the Committee on Crime Prevention. 2.16

2.17 4.8 A bill introduced by a committee need not be referred to a standing committee unless a question arises. It must lie over one day before being given its second reading. 2.18

2.19 4.9 A member may question the reference of a bill during the order of business of first 2.20 reading on the day of introduction. When a member questions the reference of a bill, the bill must be referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and Administration to report the proper 2.21reference. Upon adoption of the report of the Committee on Rules and Administration, the bill 2.22 must be referred accordingly. 2.23

5. RECALL FROM COMMITTEE

5.1 With the concurrence of the chief author of the bill, before the deadline for committee 2.25 2.26 action on a bill, a majority of the whole Senate may recall the bill from a committee and re-refer it to any other committee or place it on General Orders. After the committee deadline for action 2.27 on a bill, 41 affirmative votes of the whole Senate may recall the bill from any committee and 2.28 re-refer it to any other committee or place it on General Orders. 2.29

2.30 5.2 By a report of the Committee on Rules and Administration adopted by the Senate, the Committee on Rules and Administration, on request of the chief author, may remove a bill from 2.31 committee and re-refer it to any other committee or place it on General Orders. 2.32

2.33

6. **RESOLUTIONS**

3.1 6.1 Memorial resolutions addressed to the President or the Congress of the United States,
3.2 or a house or member of Congress, or a department or officer of the United States, or a state or
3.3 foreign government, joint resolutions, and resolutions requiring the signature of the Governor
3.4 must follow the same procedure as bills before being adopted.

6.3 When a member gives notice of intent to debate a resolution not required to follow the
same procedure as bills and not offered by the Committee on Rules and Administration, the
resolution must lie over one calendar day without debate or other action.

3.9 6.4 Upon the request of a member, the resolution must be referred to the proper committee.
3.10 If a question arises concerning the proper reference the procedure provided by Rule 4.9 applies.

7. BUDGET RESOLUTION

6.2 A resolution may not be changed to a bill, and a bill may not be changed to a resolution.

3.12 7.1 The Committees on Taxes and on Finance must hold hearings as necessary to determine3.13 state revenues and appropriations for the fiscal biennium.

3.14 7.2 Within 30 days after the last state general fund revenue and expenditure forecast for the next fiscal biennium becomes available during the regular session in the odd-numbered year, and 3.15 3.16 after receiving from the Committee on Taxes a resolution containing its recommendation on the 3.17 maximum limit on revenues and an amount to be set aside as a budget reserve and a cash flow account, the Committee on Finance must adopt and report to the Senate a budget resolution, in the 3.18 3.19 form of a Senate resolution. The budget resolution must set: (1) the maximum limit on revenues and net appropriations for the next fiscal biennium for the general fund; and (2) an amount or 3.20 3.21 amounts to be set aside as a budget reserve and a cash flow account. The budget resolution must not specify, limit, or prescribe revenues or appropriations by any category other than those 3.22 specified in clauses (1) and (2). If the Committee on Finance recommends a maximum limit on 3.23 revenues or an amount for the budget reserve or cash flow account that differs from the amount 3.24 recommended by the Committee on Taxes, the recommendation of the Committee on Finance 3 25 must be referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration before it may be considered 3 26 by the Senate. 3.27

7.3 After the Senate adopts the budget resolution, the limits in the resolution are effective
during the regular session in the year in which the resolution is adopted, unless the Senate, acting
upon a subsequent report of the Committee on Taxes as to revenues or of the Committee on
Finance as to appropriations, adopts a different limit or limits for the same fiscal biennium.
During the regular session in the even-numbered year, before the Committee on Finance reports
a bill containing net appropriations in excess of the general fund appropriations in the current
fiscal biennium estimated by the most recent state budget forecast, the Committee must adopt

a budget resolution that accounts for the net appropriations. After the Committee adopts the
budget resolution, it is effective during the regular session that year, unless the Committee adopts
a different or amended resolution.

7.4 Within 14 days after the Senate or the Committee on Finance adopts a budget resolution, 4.4 the Committee must adopt, by resolution, limits for each major appropriation bill identified in 4.5 this Rule. After the Committee adopts the resolution, the limits in the resolution are effective 4.6 during the regular session in the year in which the resolution is adopted, unless the Committee 4.7 subsequently adopts different or amended limits for the same fiscal biennium. If the Committee 4.8 on Finance or the Senate combines two or more major appropriation bills into one bill, the limits 4.9 in the Committee resolution pertaining to those bills are also combined, and the sum of the 4.10 4.11 combined limits applies to the combined bill.

4.12 7.5 The major tax and appropriation bills are:

4.13 (1) the omnibus tax bill;

4.14 (2) the early childhood education appropriations bill;

- 4.15 (3) the K-12 education appropriations bill;
- 4.16 (4) the higher education appropriations bill;

4.17 (5) the environment, agriculture, and economic development appropriations bill;

4.18 (6) the health and human services appropriations bill;

4.19 (7) the public safety appropriations bill;

- 4.20 (8) the state government appropriations bill;
- 4.21 (9) the transportation appropriations bill; and
- 4.22 (10) the omnibus capital investment bill.
- 4.23 A major appropriation or tax bill may not be divided.

4.24 7.6 After the adoption of a resolution by the Senate or by the Committee on Finance, the 4.25 Committee on Finance and the Committee on Taxes must reconcile each bill recommended by the 4.26 committee with the resolution or resolutions. When reporting a bill, the committee must certify to 4.27 the Senate that the committee has reconciled the fiscal effect of the bill with the resolution or 4.28 resolutions and that the bill, as reported by the committee, together with other bills reported and 4.29 expected to be reported by the committee, does not and will not exceed the limits specified 4.30 in either resolution.

4.31 7.7 After the adoption of a resolution by the Senate or the Committee on Finance, an
4.32 amendment to a bill is out of order if it would cause any of the limits specified in either resolution
4.33 to be exceeded. Whether an amendment is out of order under this Rule is a question to be
4.34 decided in the Senate by the President and in committee by the committee chair. In making the
4.35 determination, the presiding officer may consider:

5.1	(1) the limits in a resolution;
5.2	(2) the effect of existing laws on revenues and appropriations;
5.3	(3) the effect of amendments previously adopted to the bill under consideration;
5.4	(4) the effect of bills previously recommended by a committee or bills previously passed in the
5.5	legislative session by the Senate or by the Legislature;
5.6	(5) whether appropriation increases or revenue decreases that would result from the amendment
5.7	are offset by decreases in other appropriations or increases in other revenue specified by the
5.8	amendment; and
5.9	(6) other information reasonably related to appropriation and revenue amounts.
5.10	8. CONFIRMATIONS
5.11	8.1 Every gubernatorial appointment requiring the advice and consent of the Senate must
5.12	be referred by the President to the appropriate committee. If a question arises as to the proper
5.13	committee, the appointment must be referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and
5.14	Administration for a report making the proper reference.
5.15	8.2 An appointment referred to committee and not reported to the Senate within one year
5.16	after it was referred is withdrawn from committee and placed on the confirmation calendar for
5.17	consideration by the Senate before adjournment of the regular session.
5.18	8.3 The final question on the appointment is, "Will the Senate, having given its advice, now
5.19	consent to this appointment?" The question must not be put the same day the appointment is
5.20	received or on the day it is reported by committee except by unanimous consent. Confirmation of
5.21	the appointment requires the affirmative vote of a majority of the whole Senate.
5.22	9. STANDING COMMITTEES
5.23	The standing committees of the Senate are as follows:

10. APPOINTMENTS TO STANDING COMMITTEES

10.1 The majority and minority groups must each be represented on all standing committees
of the Senate substantially in proportion to their numbers in the Senate. The majority group shall
assign the number of positions the minority group will hold on each committee. The minority
group must be given adequate notice of its positions before the session begins.

6.9 10.2 Both the majority and minority groups shall appoint their own members to fill the number of positions each group will hold on each committee and budget division. The minority 6.10 group shall transmit notice of its assignments to the majority group within ten calendar days after 6 11 receipt of the notice of positions available. The minority group may designate a ranking member 6.12 for each committee. Nothing prohibits a member of the minority group from serving as chair or 6.13 vice chair of a committee, subcommittee, division, or commission. If the minority group for any 6.14 reason fails to make its appointments pursuant to this rule, the majority group may make all the 6.15 6.16 committee and budget division assignments.

6.17 10.3 The majority and minority committee assignments are subject to the uniform criteria
6.18 governing committee assignments applicable to both the majority and minority groups. The
6.19 uniform criteria must be promulgated by the majority group and transmitted to the minority group
6.20 together with notification of committee and budget division positions available to the minority.

6.21 10.4 The Senate resolution establishing representation on all Senate standing committees6.22 must set forth committee assignments as made by the majority and minority groups.

6.23 10.5 A member may not serve as the chair of the same standing committee or the same
6.24 division of a standing committee, or a committee or division with substantially the same
6.25 jurisdiction, for more than three consecutive Senate terms. This limit does not apply to the
6.26 Committee on Rules and Administration. This limit applies to time served as a chair in the
6.27 seventy-eighth legislature and thereafter.

6.28 10.6 After the organization of the Senate and after consultation and advice from the minority
6.29 leader, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration may add members to or delete
6.30 members from the standing committees.

6.31

11. APPOINTMENTS BY SUBCOMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES

6.32 11.1 The Committee on Rules and Administration may constitute a standing Subcommittee6.33 on Committees, the report of which within its jurisdiction has the effect of a report of the

Committee on Rules and Administration. The subcommittee consists of five members, one of whom must be a member of the minority group. 7.2

11.2 Unless otherwise provided, the Subcommittee on Committees shall appoint all 7.3 members of commissions or other bodies authorized to be appointed by the Senate and report the 7.4 appointments to the Senate. 7.5

7.6

12. COMMITTEE MEETINGS

12.1 All meetings of the Senate, its committees, committee divisions, and subcommittees are 7.7 open to the public. A meeting of a caucus of the members of any of those bodies from the same 7.8 7.9 political party need not be open to the public. A caucus of the Hennepin county, Ramsey county, 7.10 or St. Louis county delegation is open to the public. For purposes of this rule, a meeting occurs when a quorum is present and action is taken regarding a matter within the jurisdiction of the body. 7.11

7.12 12.2 Any person may submit to the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration a complaint that members have violated the open meeting requirements of Minnesota Statutes, 7.13 section 3.055. A member of the Senate may submit the complaint either orally or in writing; 7.14 7.15 others must submit the complaint in writing. Whether the complaint was written or oral, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration shall immediately forward it in writing to 7.16 7.17 the Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct without disclosing the identity of the complainant. The complaint must not be further disclosed without the consent of the complainant, except to the 7.18 members against whom the complaint was made, unless the complaint was made by a member of 7.19 the Senate in writing under oath, in which case the investigatory procedures of Rule 55 apply. 7.20

To the extent practical, a committee, subcommittee, or division shall announce each 7.21 12.3 meeting to the public at least three calendar days before convening. The notice must state the 7.22 name of the committee, subcommittee, or division, the bill or bills to be considered, and the place 7.23 and time of meeting. The notice must be posted on the Senate's Web site and on all Senate 7.24 bulletin boards in the Capitol and the State Office Building. A notice must be sent to the House of 7.25 Representatives for posting as it deems necessary. If the three-day notice requirement cannot be 7.26 7.27 met, the committee, subcommittee, or division shall give simultaneous notice to all of the known proponents and opponents of the bill as soon as practicable. 7.28

12.4 A Senate committee, subcommittee, or division shall adjourn no later than 10:00 p.m. 7.29 each day, unless two-thirds of the members present vote to suspend this requirement. 7.30

12.5 7.31 Committees, subcommittees, and divisions may not meet while the Senate is in session without permission of the Senate. The names of the members excused shall be printed 7.32 in the Journal. 7.33

- 8.1 12.6 A majority of its members constitutes a quorum of a committee, subcommittee, or
 8.2 division.
- 8.3 12.7 Each standing committee of the Senate, including a subcommittee or division of the
 8.4 committee, may at any time sit and act, investigate and take testimony on any matter within its
 8.5 jurisdiction, report hearings held by it, and make expenditures as authorized by the Committee on
 8.6 Rules and Administration.
- 8.7 12.8 A standing committee, but not a subcommittee or division, may require by subpoena
 8.8 or otherwise the attendance and testimony of witnesses and the production of correspondence,
 8.9 books, papers, and documents, in the manner provided by Minnesota Statutes, section 3.153.
- 8.10 12.9 Upon the request of a member of a committee, subcommittee, or division to which a bill
 8.11 has been referred, or upon the request of the chief author of the bill, a record must be made of the
 8.12 vote on the bill or any amendment in the committee, subcommittee, or division.
- 8.13 12.10 Upon request of three members of the committee before the vote is taken, the record
 8.14 of a roll call vote in a standing committee must accompany the committee report and be printed
 8.15 in the Journal.
- 8.16 12.11 A committee report may only be based on action taken at a regular or special meeting
 8.17 of the committee. A report in violation of this rule is out of order.
- 8.18

13. HOUR OF CONVENING

8.19 If the Senate adjourns without setting a time to reconvene, the Senate shall convene on the8.20 next legislative day at 10:00 a.m.

8.21

14. PRESIDENT

8.22 14.1 The President shall take the chair at the time to which the Senate adjourned. The
8.23 President shall immediately call the members to order and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall
8.24 proceed with the regular order of business.

8.25 14.2 The President may call a member to preside. In the absence of the President, the
8.26 President Pro Tem, the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration, or the Chair's
8.27 designee, shall preside over the Senate. In the absence of the President and the Chair, the Senate
8.28 may select a member to perform the duties of the President. Substitutions do not extend beyond
8.29 adjournment.

14.3 The President shall preserve order and decorum, may speak on points of order in
preference to members, and shall also decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the
Senate by a member.

9.1 14.4 An appeal is decided by a majority vote of those present and voting. Upon an appeal
9.2 from the decision of the President, the question is, "Shall the decision of the President be the
9.3 judgment of the Senate?"

9.4 14.5 The President shall sign all acts, memorials, addresses and resolutions. All writs,
9.5 warrants, and subpoenas issued by the Senate must be signed by the President and attested by the
9.6 Secretary.

9.7 14.6 Upon a finding by the Committee on Rules and Administration that the President refuses
9.8 or is unable to sign any of the documents described in this rule, the Chair of the Committee on
9.9 Rules and Administration, or some other member selected by the committee, shall assume the
9.10 duties of the President under this rule until the President is able to sign the documents described
9.11 or until the Senate elects a new President, whichever occurs first.

9.12

15. ADMISSION TO SENATE CHAMBER

9.13 15.1 The Senate Chamber is reserved for Senate use.

9.14 15.2 A person may not be admitted to the Senate Chamber except as provided in these rules.
9.15 A member, an officer, the constitutional officers, ex-Governors of the State of Minnesota, members
9.16 of the House, judges of the trial and appellate courts and members of Congress may be admitted.

9.17 15.3 Past members of Congress or of the state Legislature who are not interested in any claim
9.18 or directly in a bill pending before the Legislature may be personally admitted by a member of
9.19 the Senate.

9.20 15.4 An employee of either house may be admitted at the request of a member or an officer9.21 of the Senate.

9.22 15.5 The head of a department of state government may be admitted by the President.

9.23 15.6 A member of another state, provincial, or national legislative body may be admitted to
9.24 the floor by any member of the Senate. A member of another legislative body who is admitted
9.25 to the floor may be introduced to the Senate by the President.

- 9.26 15.7 When the Senate is not meeting, a person who is not a member may be admitted to the9.27 floor at the request of a member or an officer.
- 9.28 15.8 Public hearings may not be held in the Senate Chamber. The Senate Chamber may not9.29 be used for any commercial purpose.
- 9.30 15.9 The Retiring Room of the Senate is reserved for the exclusive use of the members of the9.31 Senate at all times. The Sergeant at Arms shall strictly enforce this rule.
- 9.32 15.10 When a member-elect is sworn in, the member-elect may request that one guest be9.33 admitted until the member-elect has been sworn in.

16. PRIVILEGE OF REPORTERS

10.2 16.1 The Secretary shall provide space for news reporters on the Senate floor in limited numbers, and in the Senate gallery. Because of limited space on the floor, permanent space is 10.3 limited to those news agencies that regularly cover the legislature, namely: The Associated Press, 10.4 St. Paul Pioneer Press, St. Paul Legal Ledger, Star Tribune, Duluth News-Tribune, The Forum, 10.5 Rochester Post-Bulletin, St. Cloud Times, WCCO radio, KSTP radio, Minnesota Public Radio, 10.6 and Minnesota News Network. The Secretary shall provide an additional two spaces to other 10.7 reporters if space is available. One person from each named agency and one person from the 10.8 Senate Publications Office may be present at the press table on the Senate floor at any time. Other 10.9 news media personnel may occupy seats provided in the Senate gallery. 10.10

10.11 16.2 The Secretary shall compile and distribute to the public a directory of reporters
10.12 accredited to report from the Senate floor. The directory must include each reporter's picture
10.13 and news organization and a brief biography.

10.14 16.3 The Secretary must issue each accredited reporter an identification badge showing the
10.15 reporter's name and news organization. The reporter must wear the badge when in the Senate
10.16 Chamber.

10.17

10.1

17. DECORUM

10.18 17.1 In case of a disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobbies or galleries, the President10.19 may order them cleared.

10.20 17.2 A member may not introduce a visitor or visitors in the galleries from the floor or10.21 rostrum of the Senate.

10.22 17.3 Smoking is not permitted in the Senate Chamber or galleries, the Retiring Room,
10.23 hearing rooms, offices, or other spaces under the control of the Senate.

10.24 17.4 During floor proceedings, picture taking by persons other than accredited news or 10.25 legislative photographers, picture taking with floodlights or flash units, and visual or audible 10.26 disruptions are prohibited. At all times, demonstrations and food or beverages are prohibited 10.27 in the Senate Chamber and in the galleries.

10.28 17.5 Television recording or broadcasting on the Senate floor is under the direction of the10.29 Secretary.

18. ORDER OF BUSINESS

10.31 18.1 The order of business is as follows:

10.32 1. Petitions, letters, remonstrances.

10.33 2. Executive and official communications.

11.14	18.2 Under the order of business of Motions and Resolutions, the Senate may by a majority
11.15	vote of the whole Senate temporarily revert or proceed to any other order of business.
11.16	19. PETITIONS AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS
11.17	19.1 In presenting a petition, memorial, remonstrance or other communication addressed to
11.18	the Senate, a member shall only state the general purpose of it.
11.19	19.2 Every petition, memorial, remonstrance, resolution, bill and report of committee, must
11.20	have an appropriate title, and the name of the member presenting it written on it.
11.21	19.3 Every written communication distributed to members in the Senate Chamber must have
11.22	the name of the member or officer distributing it displayed on it.
11.23	20. MESSAGES FROM THE HOUSE
11.24	A message from the House of Representatives that a Senate bill has been amended, and the
11.25	amendment, must be printed and placed on the members' desks before a member may move to
11.26	concur in the House amendment. If the amendment has been printed in the House Journal for a
11.27	preceding day and is available to the members, the Journal copy may serve as the printed copy.
11.28	21. OBJECTIONS TO COMMITTEE REFERRALS
11.29	A member may question the proper reference of a bill at the time the bill is reported by a
11.30	standing committee to which it was previously referred. When a member questions the reference
11.31	of a bill, the bill must be referred without debate to the Committee on Rules and Administration
11.32	to report the proper reference. Upon adoption of the report of the Committee on Rules and
11.33	Administration, the bill must be referred accordingly.
11.34	22. GENERAL ORDERS

12.1 22.1 The Secretary shall make a list of all bills, resolutions, reports of committees, and other
12.2 proceedings of the Senate that are referred to the Committee of the Whole and number them. The
12.3 lists are called the "General Orders".

12.4 22.2 Items on General Orders must be taken up in the order in which they are numbered12.5 unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee.

12.6 22.3 General Orders, together with all bills required to be included on it, must be
12.7 electronically available or printed at least one calendar day before being considered in Committee
12.8 of the Whole.

12.9 22.4 With the concurrence of the chief author of the bill, a majority of the whole Senate may12.10 at any time take a bill from the table and place it on General Orders.

23. COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

12.12 23.1 All bills, memorials, orders, resolutions and votes requiring the approval of the
12.13 Governor must, after a second reading, be considered in Committee of the Whole before they are
12.14 finally acted upon by the Senate, unless considered on the Consent Calendar or as a Special Order.

12.15 23.2 The President may call a member to the Chair when the Senate resolves itself into the12.16 Committee of the Whole.

12.17 23.3 The rules observed in the Senate govern, as far as practicable, the proceedings of the
12.18 Committee of the Whole, and the Chair of the Committee of the Whole has the powers of the
12.19 President, as appropriate. However, a member may speak more than twice on the same subject
12.20 and a call for the previous question may not be made.

12.21 23.4 Three members may request a roll call vote. The vote must be recorded in the Journal12.22 along with the amendment.

12.23 23.5 The recommendations of the Committee of the Whole must be reported to the Senate.
12.24 The question is on the adoption or rejection of the report, and no other question may be admitted.
12.25 The question may be divided to permit separate Senate action on the report as to any bill.

12.26 23.6 On adoption of the report of the Committee of the Whole, all bills recommended to12.27 pass must be placed on the Calendar.

24. CALENDAR

12.29 24.1 The Secretary shall make a Calendar of all bills, resolutions and other matters approved
12.30 by the Committee of the Whole for final action. The Secretary shall place them on the Calendar in
12.31 the order in which they have been acted upon in Committee of the Whole.

12.32 24.2 The Calendar must be electronically available or printed at least one calendar day12.33 before the matters on it are considered.

25. CONSENT CALENDAR 13.1 13.2 25.1 If a committee determines that a bill it recommends to pass is not likely to be opposed, the committee may recommend that the bill be placed on the Consent Calendar. If the committee 13.3 report is adopted, the bill must be electronically available or printed and placed on the Consent 13.4 Calendar after its second reading. MOTIONS** 13.31 27.1 A motion or amendment must be written if a member requests. It must identify the 13.32 13.33 member or committee offering it.

14.1	27.2 When a motion is made, it must be stated by the President. If it is in writing, it must be

14.3	27.3 After a motion is stated by the President, or read by the Secretary, it is in possession of

14.16	28.2 Motions numbered 1, 2, 4 and 5 above are not debatable.
14.17	28.3 These motions have precedence in the foregoing order; but when a motion for the
14.18	previous question has been made, or the main question ordered, a motion to lay on the table
14.19	is not in order.
14.20	28.4 A motion to postpone to a day certain, to refer, to postpone indefinitely, or to amend,
14.21	having been decided, may not again be put on the same day, nor at the same stage of the bill
14.22	or proposition.
14.23	29. MOTION TO ADJOURN
14.24	A motion to adjourn or a motion to adjourn to a time certain is always in order. The latter
14.25	motion is debatable solely as to the time. When either motion is rejected, it may not be renewed
14.26	until further business has been transacted.
14.27	30. MOTION TO RECONSIDER
14.28	30.1 When a motion or question has been decided, a member who voted with the prevailing
14.29	side may move for reconsideration on the same day on which the vote was taken or within the
14.30	next two calendar days or, if later, the first day the Senate meets after the vote was taken. The
14.31	motion takes precedence over all other questions except a motion to adjourn or recess. When a

31. MOTION FOR THE PREVIOUS QUESTION

31.1 Unless a motion for the previous question is made specifically applicable to a subsidiary
motion, it must be in this form: "Shall the main question now be put?" If the motion for the
previous question is supported by a majority of the members present, its effect is to put an end
to all debate and bring the Senate to a direct vote upon all pending amendments in their order
and then upon the main question.

15.14 31.2 On a motion for the previous question, a call of the Senate is in order before the15.15 President submits the question to the Senate.

15.16 31.3 On a motion for the previous question there is no debate. All incidental questions of 15.17 order, arising after a motion is made for the previous question, and pending the motion, must be 15.18 decided, whether on appeal or otherwise, without debate.

32. MOTION TO REFER

A bill or resolution may be referred to committee at any time before its passage. If an amendment is reported on the referral to any committee other than the Committee of the Whole, it must again be read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, read the third time and placed on final passage. If the referral is to the Committee of the Whole it must be placed at the head of General Orders, except when the referral is from the Consent Calendar under Rule 25.4.

33. MOTION TO AMEND BILL OR RESOLUTION

15.26 33.1 A motion to amend must be written if a member requests. It must identify the member15.27 offering it.

15.28 33.2 In drawing an amendment to a bill or resolution, reference must be made, first to the
number of the bill, then to the page, and then to the line or lines where language is to be stricken
or inserted.

15.31 33.3 In filling blanks, the largest sum, the longest time and the greatest distance must be15.32 first taken.

16.1 33.4 The title to a bill may be amended by the Secretary at any time the bill is amended16.2 by the Senate.

16.3 33.5 An amendment is not in order to a bill on the Calendar or after third reading without 16.4 the unanimous consent of the Senate unless it fills a blank, amends the title, is proposed to the 16.5 chief author of the bill by the Revisor of Statutes to correct technical defects found by the Revisor 16.6 while engrossing earlier amendments to the bill, or is proposed to a bill on the Consent Calendar 16.7 before the bill is given its third reading.

34. MOTION TO SUSPEND RULES

16.9 34.1 A rule may be suspended by a vote of at least two-thirds of the whole Senate.

16.10 34.2 A motion to suspend the rules for the purpose of advancing a bill may be made only16.11 under the order of business, "Motions and Resolutions".

35. GERMANENESS

16.13 35.1 An amendment proposed to the Senate or to the Committee of the Whole that is not16.14 germane is out of order.

16.15 35.2 A non-germane amendment includes one that relates to a substantially different subject,
16.16 or is intended to accomplish a substantially different purpose, than that of the original bill to
16.17 which it is proposed.

16.18 35.3 An amendment to insert a constitutional amendment is not germane to a bill that does16.19 not already include a constitutional amendment.

16.20 35.4 Whether an amendment is germane is to be decided by the President, who may put the16.21 question to the body if the President chooses.

16.22 35.5 A motion to remove an amendment placed on a House bill under Rule 45.1 is out of
16.23 order if removal of the amendment would make a portion of the House bill not germane to the
16.24 Senate companion for which it was substituted.

16.25 35.6 If a House amendment to a Senate bill is not germane to the Senate bill, a motion to16.26 concur in the House amendment is out of order.

16.27

36. DEBATE

36.1 When a member is about to speak to the Senate, the member shall rise and respectfully
address "Mr. (or Madam) President." The member may not proceed to speak further until
recognized by the President.

16.31 36.2 The member shall speak only to the question under debate and avoid personality.

The member may inform the Senate of the Governor's position on a bill and on its 17.1 36.3 status in the House of Representatives. 17.236.4 In discussing a resolution, each member is limited to ten minutes. 17.3 36.5 A member may not speak more than twice on the same question on the same day 174 without permission of the Senate. 17.5 36.6 When a member is speaking, no one may stand between the member speaking and the 17.6 President. 17.7 36.7 A member may not speak without using a microphone. 17.8 36.8 All remarks during debate shall be addressed to the President. 17.9 When the President puts a question, or addresses the Senate, no one may walk out of or 17.10 36.9 cross the Chamber. 17.11 36.10 When a member is called to order, the member shall be silent until it is determined 17.12 17.13 whether or not the member is in order. If a member is called to order for words spoken in debate, the words excepted to must be taken down in writing by the Secretary immediately. 17.14 17.15 **37. ABSENCE OF MEMBERS** 17.16 A member or officer of the Senate may not be absent from a session of the Senate unless excused by the Senate. The name of a member excused must be printed in the Journal. 17.17 **38. CALL OF THE SENATE** 17.18 A member may impose a call of the Senate requiring the attendance of all members 17.19 38.1 17.20 before any further proceedings occur except a motion to adjourn. 38.2 Upon the imposition of a call, a member may request a record of those present and the 17.21 Sergeant at Arms shall bring in the absent members. 17.22 When the Senate has been placed under call, a member may demand that the doors be 38.3 17.23 closed and that no member be permitted to leave the Chamber until the matter or question, if any, 17.24 17.25 under consideration at the time of the call is disposed of, or until the call is lifted by a majority of the whole Senate, or until the Senate adjourns. 17.26 38.4 A majority of the whole Senate may excuse members not answering the call. 17.27 38.5 A call may not be imposed after voting has commenced. 17.28 **39. DIVISION OF QUESTION** 17.29 A member may call for a division of the question when the division is possible. A 17.30 39.1

17.31 motion to strike and insert is indivisible.

18.1	39.2 The defeat of a motion to strike does not preclude an amendment nor a motion to
18.2	strike and insert.
18.3	40. VOTING
18.4	40.1 The President shall distinctly state the question before taking the vote. The President
18.5	shall declare the result of the vote. If a member questions the result of a vote, the President
18.6	shall order a division.
18.7	40.2 A member may vote on a question or be counted on a division only at the member's own
18.8	seat in the Senate Chamber.
18.9	40.3 At any time before the start of voting on a question, a member may request a roll call
18.10	vote, which must be entered in the Journal.
18.11	40.4 Unless otherwise ordered, a roll call vote, except upon elections, may be taken by means
18.12	of the electrical voting system under the control of the President.
18.13	40.5 A roll call vote may not be interrupted except to close the roll as provided in Rule 41.3.
18.14	40.6 A member or other person may not proceed to or remain by the Secretary's desk while a
18.15	roll call or division is being taken.
18.16	41. MEMBERS TO VOTE UNLESS EXCUSED
18.17	41.1 Every member who is in the Senate Chamber during a roll call shall vote upon the
18.18	request of another member unless excused by the Senate.
18.19	41.2 A motion by a member to be excused from voting must be made before the question is
18.20	put. A member wishing to be excused from voting may make a brief statement of the reason for
18.21	making the request. The question on the motion to excuse must be taken without further debate.
18.22	41.3 When members have had an opportunity to vote and fail to do so, a majority of the
18.23	whole Senate may, by motion, direct the President to close the roll.
18.24	41.4 The vote on a motion to close the roll must be taken without debate. No member
18.25	is required to vote on the motion.
18.26	42. FINAL PASSAGE
18.27	The final question on a bill or other matter requiring action by both Houses after its first and
18.28	second reading, and after the consideration in Committee of the Whole, is on its final passage.
18.29	43. TRANSMITTING BILLS TO THE HOUSE
18.30	43.1 Except when a motion to reconsider has been made as provided in Rule 30, immediately
18.31	after the passage of a bill or other matter in which the concurrence of the House of Representatives
18.32	is requested, the Secretary shall transmit it to the House.

- 43.2 On the concurrence of a bill or other matter of the House by the Senate, or on theconcurrence or disagreement in a vote of the House, the Secretary shall notify the House.

44. ENGROSSING AND ENROLLING OF BILLS

44.1 The Secretary and the Engrossing Secretary shall ensure that every bill, memorial, or
resolution originating in the Senate is carefully engrossed before it is transmitted to the House
of Representatives for concurrence.

- 19.7 All engrossing and enrolling of bills shall be done at the direction and under authority of19.8 the Senate.
- 44.2 The Secretary shall ensure that every bill, memorial, or resolution originating in the
 Senate is carefully enrolled by the Revisor of Statutes before it is presented to the Governor
 or filed with the Secretary of State.

45. COMPARISON AND SUBSTITUTION OF BILLS

45.1 A House bill, after its first reading, must be referred as follows, unless there is a motionby the Chair of the Committee on Rules and Administration or a designee of the Chair:

(a) If there is no Senate companion bill, the House bill must be referred to the appropriatestanding committee, unless there is objection under Rule 4.9.

19.17 (b) If there is a Senate companion bill, the House bill must be referred to the standing19.18 committee possessing the Senate companion.

46. CONFERENCE COMMITTEES

The Subcommittee on Committees shall appoint all conference committees of the Senate and report the appointments to the Senate. In the appointment of members of conference committees between the two houses, the Subcommittee on Committees shall appoint those who are in accord with the position of the Senate. Whenever practical, the subcommittee shall give preference to authors of bills in dispute and to members of standing committees in which the bills were considered.

47. DISPOSITION OF BILLS ON ADJOURNMENT

Adjournment of the regular session in an odd-numbered year to a date certain in the following 20.8 year is equivalent to daily adjournment, except that a bill on the Calendar, Consent Calendar, or 20.9 General Orders must be returned to the standing committee other than the Committee on Rules 20.10 and Administration from which it was last reported to the Senate, unless otherwise provided for 20.11 20.12 by motion before adjournment. 48. PRINTING AND DISTRIBUTION OF BILLS

48.1 Unless otherwise ordered by the Senate, all Senate bills that have been reported upon
favorably or without recommendation by a committee must be electronically available or printed
before consideration by the Senate or the Committee of the Whole.

20.20 48.2 A House bill amended by the Senate must be unofficially engrossed and electronically20.21 available or printed when placed on General Orders.

20.22 48.3 A bill may be electronically available or printed by order of the Secretary when20.23 amended after second reading.

20.24 48.4 A bill must be electronically available or printed when ordered by the Senate.

20.25 48.5 Action by the Senate on a bill that has not been printed is a waiver of the printing20.26 requirement.

20.27 48.6 To the extent practical, the Secretary shall provide a copy of any bill to the public20.28 and may charge a reasonable fee.

20.29

49. JOURNAL AND INDEX

20.30 49.1 The Secretary shall keep a correct Journal of the proceedings of the Senate and shall20.31 perform other duties assigned to the Secretary.

49.2 The Secretary shall not permit Journal records, accounts or papers to be taken out of the
Secretary's custody, other than in the regular mode of business. If a document in the Secretary's
charge is missing, the Secretary shall report the fact to the President, so that inquiry may be made.
49.3 The Secretary shall supervise the recording of proceedings in the Journal, the
engrossing, transcribing and copying of bills and resolutions, and generally perform the duties of
Secretary, under direction of the Committee on Rules and Administration.

21.7 49.4 The Journal of each day's proceedings is open for correction at any time during the
21.8 session of the next day the Senate meets. Unless corrected on that day, the Journal stands
21.9 approved.

21.10 49.5 The Secretary shall keep a record of all Senate and House bills showing the status21.11 of each bill pending, until its final passage.

21.12

50. ELECTRONIC RECORDINGS

50.1 The Secretary shall cause to be recorded on electronic media the proceedings of the
Senate, the Committee of the Whole, and each standing committee, subcommittee, and division.
Each electronic record must be clearly labeled to show the name of the body whose proceedings
are recorded and the dates the proceedings occurred. Each electronic record of the proceedings of
the Senate and the Committee of the Whole must be accompanied by a log showing the number of
each bill considered and the places on the record where consideration of the bill occurred.

21.19 50.2 Within two working days after each Senate session, the Secretary shall make a copy
21.20 of the electronic record and corresponding log of proceedings of the Senate and the Committee
21.21 of the Whole available to the Legislative Reference Library.

21.22 50.3 Within one week after each meeting of a standing committee, subcommittee, or division,
21.23 the Secretary shall make the electronic record of the meeting available to the Legislative Reference
21.24 Library, together with an agenda showing bills considered and any action taken on them.

21.25 50.4 Upon completion and approval of the minutes of the meeting, the Secretary shall
21.26 promptly deliver a copy of the minutes to the Legislative Reference Library.

50.5 The Secretary shall keep a record of each session of the Senate and the Committee of
the Whole, each meeting of a Senate standing committee, subcommittee, or division and the date
on which the electronic record of the session or meeting was made available to the Legislative
Reference Library. The Library shall keep a similar record of all electronic records to which it
has been given access.

21.32 50.6 The Library shall provide committee staff with reasonable access to Senate electronic
21.33 records and shall provide the public with convenient facilities to listen to them.

22.1 50.7 The Secretary shall make copies of Senate electronic records available to the public for
22.2 a fee determined by the Secretary to be adequate to cover the cost of preparing the copies. A copy
22.3 must be provided free to a member of the Senate upon request for use in legislative business.

50.8 The Secretary shall keep the original electronic record and log of each session of the Senate and the Committee of the Whole until the end of the period for which the members of the existing House of Representatives have been elected, at which time the electronic record may be preserved or disposed of as the Secretary sees fit. The Legislative Reference Library shall keep electronic records, logs, and minutes forwarded to it until two years after the end of the period for which the members of the existing Senate have been elected, at which time they may be preserved or disposed of as the Library sees fit.

22.11 50.9 The Senate intends that testimony and discussion preserved under this rule not be22.12 admissible in any court or administrative proceeding on an issue of legislative intent.

51. OTHER DUTIES OF SECRETARY

22.14 51.1 The Secretary shall not issue a certificate authorizing the payment of money by virtue of
22.15 a motion or resolution, unless the motion or resolution is voted for by a majority of the whole
22.16 Senate on a roll call vote.

22.17 51.2 The Secretary and the Engrossing Secretary shall correct all mistakes in numbering
22.18 the sections and reference to them, whether the errors occur in the original bill or are caused
22.19 by amendments to it.

22.20 51.3 The Secretary is the agent of the Senate for the purchase of supplies and services. The
22.21 Secretary's records on purchase of supplies and services are open for inspection.

22.22 51.4 The Secretary shall adopt administrative controls to ensure that each member is
accountable for the member's own long distance telephone calls and that Senate telephones
are used only for Senate business.

51.5 By the 15th day of April, July, October, and January of each year, the Secretary shall
submit a detailed report of Senate expenditures during the previous quarter to the Committee on
Rules and Administration.

52. SERGEANT AT ARMS

The Secretary's public records may be inspected during normal business hours.

The Sergeant at Arms shall execute all orders of the President and perform all assigned duties connected with the police and good order of the Senate Chamber; exercise supervision over the entry and exit of all persons to and from the Chamber; see that messages are promptly delivered; see that the hall is properly ventilated and the temperature is properly regulated, and that the

Chamber is open for the use of members of the Senate at least one-half hour before the start of asession; and perform all other services pertaining to the office of Sergeant.

53. BUDGET AND EXPENDITURES

23.4 53.1 The Committee on Rules and Administration shall adopt an operating budget for the23.5 Senate.

23.6 53.2 All propositions for the appointment and payment of employees of the Senate or for
23.7 expenditures of the Legislature, other than those provided by law, must be referred without debate
23.8 to the Committee on Rules and Administration.

23.9

54. EMPLOYEES

23.10 54.1 The Committee on Rules and Administration shall establish positions, set compensation,
23.11 appoint employees, and authorize expense reimbursement for employees as it deems necessary
23.12 to carry out the work of the Senate. At the request of any committee member, an action of the
23.13 committee must be submitted as a Senate resolution for adoption by the Senate.

23.14 54.2 The Secretary shall keep a roster of all employees of the Senate, including positions and23.15 compensation, which must be open for inspection by the public.

23.16 54.3 The Secretary shall post, in a public place in the Capitol, a notice of every vacant
23.17 position on the permanent staff of the Senate. The notice must remain posted for at least two
23.18 weeks, and no vacancy may be filled until the period of posting has elapsed.

54.4 Except as otherwise provided in these rules, the Committee on Rules and Administration
has full and exclusive authority over, and charge of all employees of the Senate both elected and
appointed. The committee has the sole and exclusive power and authority to assign them to duties
other than for which they were elected or appointed as the committee may provide.

54.5 The committee may make employment rules and regulations. In case of violation of an
order of the committee by an employee, or in case of a violation of a rule or regulation made by
the committee, or in case of misconduct or omission by an employee, the Committee on Rules
and Administration may hear complaints and discharge the employee or impose discipline, a
fine, or other punishment upon the employee.

- 23.28 54.6 The Secretary shall supervise the employees under the direction of the Committee on23.29 Rules and Administration.

55. SUBCOMMITTEE ON ETHICAL CONDUCT

23.31 55.1 The Subcommittee on Committees shall appoint a Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct of
23.32 the Committee on Rules and Administration consisting of four members, two from the majority
23.33 group and two from the minority group.

24.1 55.2 The subcommittee shall serve in an advisory capacity to a member or employee upon written request and shall issue recommendations to the member or employee. A member may 24.2 request the subcommittee to provide its advice on a potential conflict of interest to the member in 24.3 24.4 private. If so requested, the subcommittee shall conduct its proceedings on the advisory opinion in private. The request, proceedings on the request, and any advice given by the subcommittee 24.5 in response to the request must remain private. The member may not use an advisory opinion 24.6 from the subcommittee as a defense to a complaint under this rule unless the opinion has been 24.7 adopted by the subcommittee at a public meeting. 24.8

55.3 The subcommittee shall investigate a complaint by a member of the Senate in writing
under oath received before adjournment sine die in the last year of a senate term or during a
special session held after that time regarding improper conduct by a member or employee of the
Senate. The subcommittee has the powers of a standing committee to issue subpoenas under
Minnesota Statutes, section 3.153.

24.14 55.4 Within 30 days after receiving a complaint, the subcommittee must meet and either
24.15 make a finding of no probable cause, vote to defer action until a certain time, or proceed with
24.16 its investigation.

55.5 In order to determine whether there is probable cause to believe that improper conduct
has occurred, the subcommittee may, by a vote of three of its members, conduct a preliminary
inquiry in executive session to which the open meeting requirements of Rules 12.1 to 12.3 do
not apply. The executive session may be ordered by a vote of three of its members whenever
the subcommittee determines that matters relating to probable cause are likely to be discussed.
The executive session must be limited to matters relating to probable cause. Upon a finding of
probable cause, further proceedings on the complaint are open to the public.

24.24 55.6 The subcommittee may appoint special counsel to provide expert advice on how
24.25 to conduct its proceedings. The subcommittee may appoint a suitable person to conduct the
24.26 investigation and report findings of fact and recommendations for action to the subcommittee.

24.27 55.7 If, after investigation, the subcommittee finds the complaint substantiated by the
evidence, it shall recommend to the Committee on Rules and Administration appropriate
disciplinary action.

24.30 55.8 To minimize disruption of its public proceedings, the subcommittee may require that
24.31 television coverage be pooled or be provided by Senate media services.

24.32 55.9 If criminal proceedings relating to the same conduct have begun, the subcommittee may
24.33 defer its proceedings until the criminal proceedings have been completed.

- 25.1 55.10 The Senate intends that proceedings of the Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct not beadmissible in any criminal proceeding.

56. STANDARDS OF ETHICAL CONDUCT

25.4 56.1 Members shall adhere to the highest standard of ethical conduct as embodied in the25.5 Minnesota Constitution, state law, and these rules.

25.6 56.2 A member shall not publish or distribute written material if the member knows or
25.7 has reason to know that the material includes any statement that is false or clearly misleading,
25.8 concerning a public policy issue or concerning the member's or another member's voting record
25.9 or position on a public policy issue.

25.10 56.3 Improper conduct includes conduct that violates a rule or administrative policy of the
25.11 Senate, that violates accepted norms of Senate behavior, that betrays the public trust, or that tends
25.12 to bring the Senate into dishonor or disrepute.

25.13

57. CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

A member who in the discharge of senatorial duties would be required to take an action or make a decision that would substantially affect the member's financial interests or those of an associated business, unless the effect on the member is no greater than on others in the member's business classification, profession, or occupation, shall disclose the potential conflict of interest by following the procedure set forth in Minnesota Statutes, section 10A.07.

58. LOBBYISTS

58.1 A lobbyist shall not appear before a Senate committee pursuant to the lobbyist's
employment unless the lobbyist is in compliance with the law requiring lobbyist registration,
Minnesota Statutes, sections 10A.03 to 10A.06. A lobbyist, when appearing before a committee,
shall disclose to the committee on whose behalf the lobbyist speaks and the purpose of the
lobbyist's appearance.

25.25 58.2 A lobbyist shall not knowingly, either directly or through a third party, furnish false or
25.26 misleading information or make a false or misleading statement that is relevant and material to a
25.27 matter before the Senate or any of its committees when the lobbyist knows or should know it
25.28 will influence the judgment or action of the Senate or any of its committees, subcommittees, or
25.29 divisions.

58.3 The Subcommittee on Ethical Conduct shall investigate a complaint by a member of the
Senate in writing under oath received before adjournment sine die in the last year of a Senate
term or during a special session held after that time that a lobbyist has violated Rule 58.1 or 58.2.
The investigatory procedures of Rule 55 apply, except as provided in this rule. The complaint
and proceedings on the complaint are private until the subcommittee has found probable cause to

- believe that a violation of Rule 58.1 or 58.2 has occurred, unless they are made public by the
 lobbyist whose conduct is the subject of the complaint or by the vote of at least three members
 of the subcommittee.
- 26.4 59. AMENDMENTS TO RULES
 26.5 Every proposition to amend a rule of the Senate must be referred to the Committee on Rules
 26.6 and Administration. The proposition may not be acted upon until the report of the committee
 26.7 is received by the Senate.
